# Parklands Conservation Park

## 12<sup>th</sup> July 2020

At 7.45 am on a Sunday, there was a surprisingly large number of cars parked at the entrance on Radar Hill Road. Our small group of bushwalkers ( Ian, Eva, Tom, Alan, Lorraine and June) met further down the road.

Our leader, Ian's plan was to combine two of the walking trails over undulating hills- a distance of about 9km. He showed us the map- 12km of wiggly coloured lines for mountain bike riders with another 15km of shared trails.

We ventured onto the track as about 20 bike riders zoomed over the hill...so that explained the number of cars at the car park!

Most intersections had maps which were essential with the large number of tracks. Some of the bike trails have interesting names - Rock and Roll, Road Rage, Ho Chi Ho and Chairlift, perhaps an indication of the level of difficulty?

The area includes a mixture of eucalypt and rain forests, with palms growing in the wetter areas. A creek crossing with rocky pools was a picturesque spot for morning tea.

Sometimes walkers can encounter two emus which were hand reared and then released into the park, but not on this occasion.

This park is well worth visiting, with its variety of mostly undercover tracks and easy accessibility.

# Kirbys Road Update

## Background

On 17 June 2020, Jinibara People Aboriginal Corporation was notified by Sunshine Coast Council that a potential cultural heritage find had been made by work crews on a newly constructed walking track within Kirby's Road Reserve near Obi Obi. This location had previously been surveyed and assessed by JPAC, and a procedure was in place to manage incidental finds. The procedure was correctly followed, and a JPAC representative accompanied by a technical adviser from Australian Heritage Specialists (AHS) inspected the find on site on 3 July 2020.

## Inspection Summary

The find was identified as an axe blank, which is a stage within the production of ground-edge axes where the stone is roughed out through the removal of a series of flakes before the grinding stage, where the edge of the axe would be formed. The axe blank may have been intended for trade prior to final shaping. The find did not have any additional artefacts, features, or material associated with it and constitutes an isolated find.

This find demonstrates a tangible link to past land use by Jiinibara within Kirby's Reserve. It also contributes to the potential that additional finds may be found during future activities.

## **Recommendations**

Cultural Heritage Inductions and the Incidental Finds Procedure have proved to be effective in both identifying cultural heritage and protecting finds within Kirby's Road Reserve. These two management measures should continue to be observed during all future works within the reserve and the details of both procedures have been outlined below.

### Training, Awareness and Stop Work Procedure

Work crews must be inducted by a Jinibara representative during a cultural heritage induction to ensure that they are able to conduct themselves in a culturally appropriate and compliant manner, prior to works commencing. The induction should cover:

- Any relevant contractor/permittee/SCC staff;
- Induction to Jinibara country.
- Culturally appropriate behaviour on Jinibara country.
- Instruction on what types of cultural heritage might be encountered on Jinibara country.
- Instruction on the Stop Work Procedure.

Aboriginal cultural heritage can be found below ground surface. Therefore, a possibility exists that cultural heritage may be encountered during construction activities that involve disturbance of the ground surface, even if the ground has previously been disturbed.

### Incidental Find Procedure

If during construction an object that may be considered to be Aboriginal cultural heritage is discovered, then the recommendation of this report is that the Stop Work procedure is followed:


- Upon a find the site supervisor should be contacted immediately
- A buffer zone of a 10 metre radius from the find should be established and all works within the buffer zone must cease immediately.
- The site supervisor should contact the Jinibara technical adviser (Australian Heritage Specialists using the contact details below) who is responsible for informing Jinibara.
- A Jinibara representative must be given access to assess the find within 24 hours of notification.
- If required, the Jinibara representative may be accompanied by a technical advisor.
